Notes About Overall Style

- All entries in a MLA bibliography should be double spaced between entries and within
 entries; be listed alphabetically and use hanging (1/2 inch) indentation for more than
 one line.
- The listing should start at the top of new page at the end of the research paper typically under the heading "Works Cited".
- When writing author names, omit all titles and degrees (e.g. Dr., Professor, Mr., Ms., PhD, MD) in the Works Cited list. Include only essential suffixes such as Jr. or a Roman numeral.
- In an article, website or work's title, capitalize the first word, the last word and all principal words, including those that follow hyphens in compound terms.
- For more information, refer to the MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers, Seventh Edition available in the Ready Reference collection (Ready Ref LB 2369.G53 2009), or visit the MLA web site (http://www.mla.org) and choose "MLA Style".

Citing Sources in the Text

Parenthetical Documentation and in text Citation

These provide a method for identifying the source of the information used. Parenthetical documentation typically begins with the name of the author and is placed in the appropriate spot in your paper. The full entry for the source referred to is located in the list of works cited.

Additional Notes

Citation within a quote:

- According to some, dreams express "profound aspects of personality" (Foulkes 184), though others disagree.
- According to Foulkes's study, dreams may express "profound aspects of personality" (184).
- Is it possible that dreams may express "profound aspects of personality" (Foulkes 184)?

Quote within a quote: use single quotation marks to enclose quotes within another quotation.

 The reporter told me, "When I interviewed the quarterback, he said they simply 'played a better game.'"

If the quote is **LONGER** than four lines of prose or three lines of verse, place quotations in a free-standing block of text and omit quotation marks. Indent **one inch** from the left margin; maintain double-spacing. Your parenthetical citation should come **after** the closing punctuation mark.
